

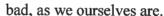
So, what are you thinking?

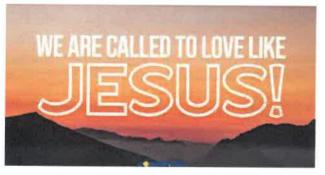

When are annoyed, or hurt or upset by someone, we easily recall the negative things they have done to us while their good deeds seem to fly out the window. If we want to love them, we have to accept that they are crazy mixtures of both good and



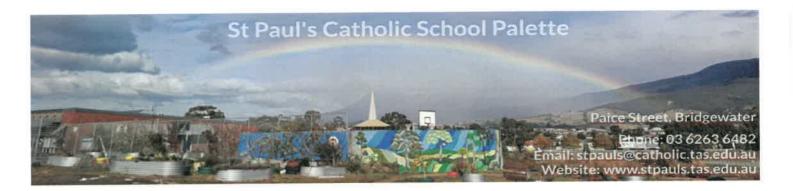

Imagine taking moments each day to recall the good qualities of your spouse, to ponder on the lovely aspects of each of your children, to notice the positive things your work colleagues do. If you are someone who tends to be negative, this exercise can feel like you are letting light into a dark place. Ironically, it might also give the inner strength to confront a negative behaviour in a positive way. This is the practical

loving of others that Jesus calls us to do.

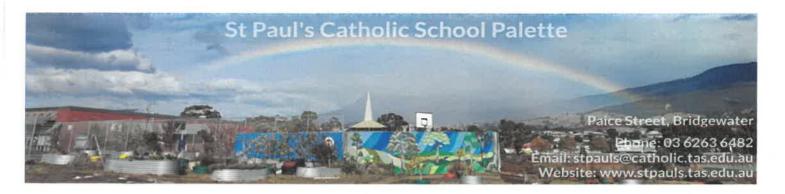

Mercy Merits

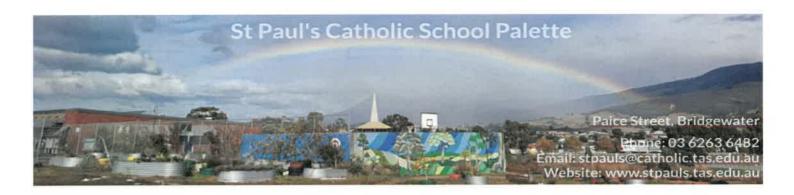

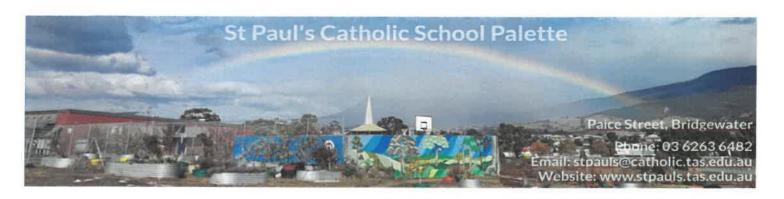












COVID-19 Update - Term Two 2022

Thank you for your continued understanding and patience as we navigate all things COVID related. We receive our advice from Public Health and Catholic Education Tasmania.

COVID Safe Behaviours

- Please use hand hygiene(sanitising or hand washing), cough etiquette and social distancing.
- Stay away from school if unwell, take a RAT/PCR Test.
- Continue to notify us if a student is COVID positive and absent from school.

Testing Positive

• Any staff or student who tests positive either by RAT or PCR must isolate for 7 days as directed by Public Health.

Masks

- All adults must wear a mask inside.
- All adults who are close contacts must wear masks when outside the home.
- Primary students do not have to wear masks.

Household close contacts - Household close contacts of a confirmed case are no longer required to quarantine at home.

For a close contact to leave home they must:

- not be symptomatic (must remain at home if they are)
- return a negative test each day before leaving home for the 7 days following their last contact with the confirmed case.
- All adults must wear a face mask in all indoor settings when outside the home. Primary-aged students are not required to wear masks.

Cold and Flu symptoms

- If students present with cold or flu-like symptoms and are unwell they will be required to stay home or may be sent home.
- If symptoms are mild e.g. a runny nose or sneezing or the student is not feeling unwell, they will need to have two negative RATs on successive days to attend school.
- If students have allergies or asthma that presents as flu-like symptoms, they may be required to get a clearance from their doctor.
- All students with asthma require an up-to-date asthma plan.

Provision of RATs

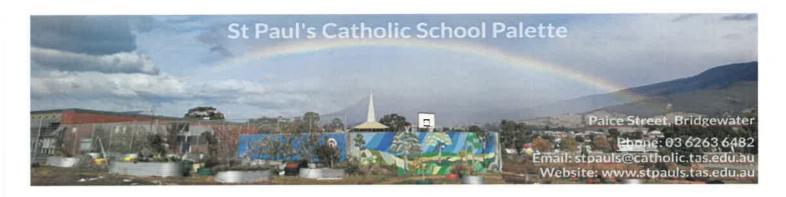
Due to limited number of RATs available, we are permitted to supply:

- 1 RAT when a student is symptomatic
- 5 RATs to students and staff who notify St Paul's Catholic School of household close contact status
- Tas Government have free RATs available for close contacts via https://www.coronavirus.tas.gov.au/keeping-yourself-safe/testing-for-covid-19/rapid-antigen-tests-rats

Exemptions

 Exemptions from testing for COVID-19 are for 12 weeks since being released from isolation due to positive COVID status.

Cross Country 2022

As part of our Health and Physical Education program all students will be participating in our annual Cross Country Carnival on Friday 10th June 2022.

Runners are to wear school sports uniform, which includes appropriate running shoes, school polo top or T-shirt in house colours, and shorts. A coat or jacket may be necessary while watching other races.

In the event of wet or muddy conditions, students will need a complete change of clothes and a plastic bag. Plenty of water to drink is essential. If your child has asthma, please ensure they have their necessary medication.

Our Cross Country Carnival is part of our physical education program and participation is compulsory. If your child is unable to participate in the run, they will have an opportunity to walk 1 lap of the track in their respective race and earn a point for their house. Please provide a signed note if you wish for your child to participate in the walk instead of the cross country run.

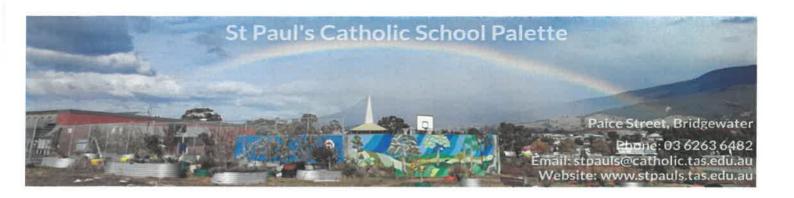
Approximate starting time (weather dependent) and distances.

- 12:20pm Grade 6 2,700m (3 laps of the School Loop)

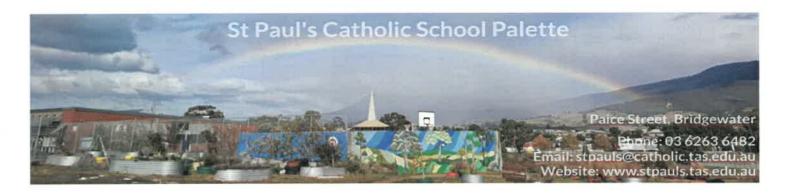

FOGO Bins Going Strong

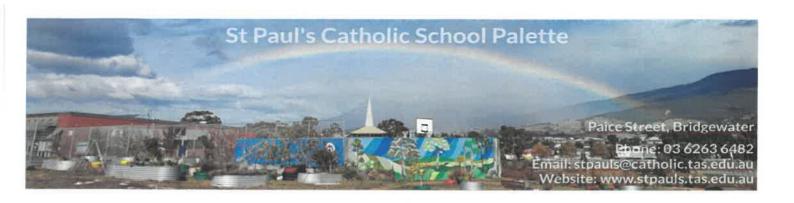

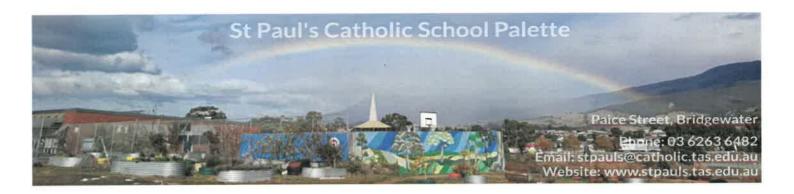

Ludo offers:

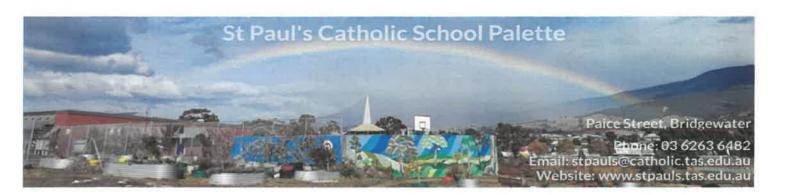
- A play-based education program.

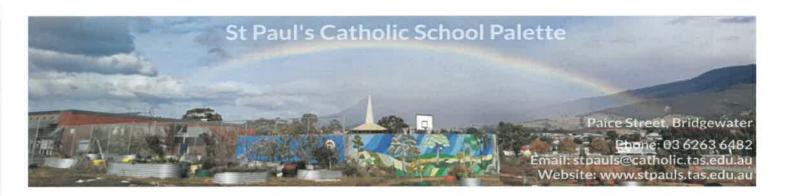

- If you have to drive, park the car a few blocks away from the school and walk the rest of the way.

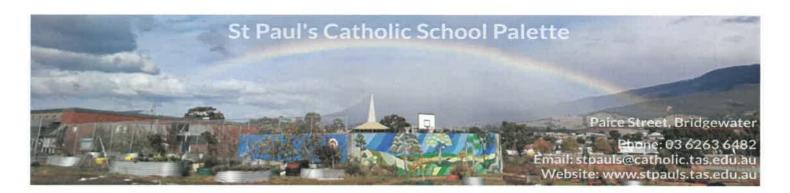

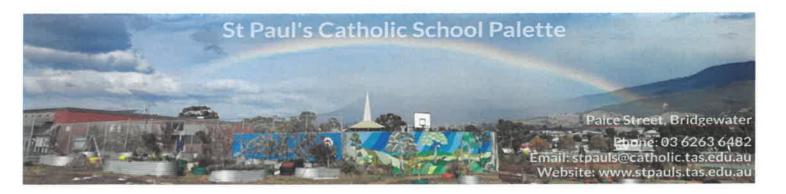


49th City to Casino Fun Run & Walk

Are viruses, cold air or wood smoke triggering you this winter?

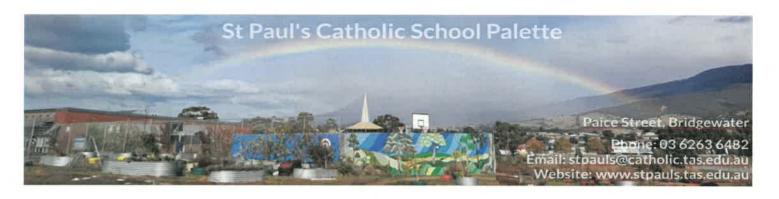

Sienna- I liked looking at all of the trains and riding on the train.

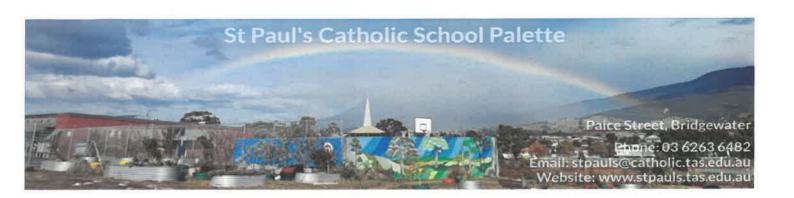
Frayah - Going up on top of the double decker tram.
