

### Jason Smith - Aboriginal Cultural Educator visit Year 1

St Paul's has recently welcomed Aboriginal Cultural Educator Jason Smith into our school community. Jason spent the morning with year 1 recently where he spoke with the children about his role as a Tasmanian Aboriginal in the maintenance and care of country. He spoke about cool burning and how this form of land management is best for maintenance of our land and keeps country in balance as plant and animal life are given the opportunity to thrive and regenerate. Jason also talked about the benefits of this form of 'burning' as a method of preventing the devastation of bushfires for people, property and country.

Jason shared many stories with the children and there was a lot of thoughtful conversation with children sharing their own stories and experiences. Jason was given a brief tour of our school as we looked at one of our bush food plants 'pig face'. Jason explained to the children how the plant can be used for medicine, particularly healing cuts, scratches and burns on the skin. He also explained that the flower of the plant can be eaten as food and described how the fruit tasted. Jason encouraged the children to become involved in caring for this, and other bush food plants, and we are hopeful that when the second stage of our bush food garden gets underway in Term 2 students will be able to help ensure that the plants not only survive but flourish.

Jason was kind enough to donate a book and some artefacts to the Year 1 class and the children were grateful to receive his thoughtful gift. In return, some of the students drew pictures of one of Jason's stories and presented them to him as they thanked him for the day. Year 1 are to be congratulated for the way they welcomed Jason into our school and participated attentively to everything Jason had to share with them.


We are excited to share with you that Jason will be visiting St Paul's regularly throughout the year, and we look forward to working and learning with him.












### **HPE - Hockey Program**


### STCPSSA Swimming

### **National Representatives**



### Prep Excursion - Marine Discovery Centre
















2023 Kindergarten Enrolments


### **Outside School Hours Care**

### St Pauls hits another sustainability milestone!


Every day students in our classrooms are helping our environment. Along with our other recycling initiatives, St Pauls have joined forces with Brighton Council and started collecting any food scraps or garden waste and putting them into FOGO\*. The council has given every classroom a caddy for unwanted food such as banana skins and apple cores, which then goes into St Pauls's FOGO bin. Our Grounds staff also love the new FOGO bin, because it takes garden waste.

Our students are learning why FOGO is so important – because food waste and garden waste, when it goes to landfill, breaks down and makes greenhouse gases, especially a very powerful one called methane. Methane is 24 times more potent at trapping the sun's heat than carbon dioxide, and globally, food waste creates more greenhouse gas emissions than every country in the world except China and the USA.\*\* Schools, councils, cities and even countries all around the world are creating laws and systems to stop FOGO waste from going into landfill and put it into a FOGO bin instead, where it gets turned into healthy compost for farmers who grow healthy food for us all. Now that's sustainable!



















