

#### Just what is Resurrection about?


This coming weekend we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus – but just what is it that we are celebrating? In a real sense it is easier to 'appreciate' his suffering and death, after all, we know suffering, we have experienced the passing of loved ones. Even the Gospel writers who experienced the risen Jesus seem baffled, speaking of someone elusive – even while they stake the rest of their lives on preaching the reality of the amazing life Jesus offered (and still offers). All our Church life hangs on the reality of this Resurrection. How are we to appreciate what it means and make it a reality in our lives?



In one of the Easter stories, two of the disciples tell the Risen Jesus, whom they have not recognised, how all their hopes had been in him and that these hopes were dashed when he was tortured and killed. Then Jesus unravels their story and gives them a new understanding of himself...and of themselves. Their hopes and dreams were true and valid – they were just looking for their fulfilment in the wrong places, in the wrong way. We too have hopes and dreams, sometimes ones so amazing that we fear even to tell them to ourselves. At heart, these dreams are about being loved and loving. Their truest fulfilment comes when we allow the Risen Jesus to speak to our hearts about these dreams and how we are to bring them to fulfilment in our lives. Then, like those two disciples, our hearts will burn within us and we will know a new light guiding us.

Loving Jesus, come walk with me. Listen to my hopes and dreams and untangle the ways in which they become twisted within me. With your love and wisdom, may they blossom into new ways of living and loving. I ask this in your name, confident that you will hear me.

# **Updated Covid Information**

Firstly, Catholic Education Tasmania would like to thank all of our parents and carers for their patience and assistance regarding enabling our schools to comply with the government's COVID-19 management requirements.

Prior to the start of term 1 Public Health, in consultation with the education sector, put in place a range of outbreak management guidelines to assist in the management of COVID-19 cases and outbreaks in schools.

Analysis by Public Health of school case data collected during term 1 has shown that the rates of severe disease for students was extremely low.


For term 2 Public Health, again in consultation with the education sector, is proposing to move from an outbreak management model to a symptoms-based model.

This will mean that the focus for term 2 will be on those persons who are symptomatic to stay away and get tested.

Testing of students who are not symptomatic will not be required unless in certain circumstances such as a rapid spike in case numbers.

Further to the above, emphasis will be renewed on personal COVID safe behaviours such as hygiene. Catholic Education Tasmania through our schools will also be taking particular care of those members of our school communities who are deemed to be vulnerable to severe illness should they become infected with COVID-19.

During the term 1 school holidays you are encouraged to follow Public Health advice and should any member of your household display symptoms please test and register if positive. School requirements regarding COVID-19 will not apply during the school holidays so please visit the Public Health website or phone the Public Health hotline should you require assistance.



# Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary

On Friday 8th April Year 1 travelled by bus to Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary to spend time on country with Jason Smith (Aboriginal Cultural Educator). Everyone was excited to spend time with Jason again as we continued to learn about healing country and cool fire burning.


Jason talked to us about how we can all play a part in caring for our environment and help to prevent bushfires. He also talked to us about how to tell if a country is healthy and how each part of the environment plays a part in supporting another. We helped to clear some bark from around the base of a large gum tree and it did not take very long to create a large pile of bark that was no longer blocking the tree or providing a source for bushfires to start.





We stood silently for a few minutes and closed our eyes to listen to what was happening around us. We heard kookaburras and cockatoos and Jason explained to us how the old people's spirits live in the trees and animals in the area and that they were happy because they could see that we were trying to help to heal the country instead of damaging it.

We can't wait for Jason to visit us again and to learn more about Tasmanian Aboriginal Culture and how to care for our country.



# Early Learning in Ludo and Kindergarten

It is our first year together and we have embraced this time to really connect with our Ludo and Kinder children to build an enriched communal setting. We have spent time creating inspiring learning environments together and here are some of the things we have focused on.



We have been having discussions about our identity and our families. We have been wondering what is special to us about our families and what we love to do with our families.

Our children then created their own family portraits which we have displayed in our room and we have selected our favourite photo of Jesus's family to display with our own family portraits.














#### St Paul's Soccer


What a great start to the new soccer season. The children are learning new skills both physically and mentally. Thank you to the parents and staff who are giving up their time to coach the teams.


# Year 6 Leadership Excursion to Bruny Island














### **Ludo Early Learning**
