


St Mary of the Cross




of 14, had to go to work to support them. She learnt early to be realistic and loving – she had a hard head and a soft heart.

Dear parents and guardians,

Term Three is well and truly into its busy phase. This week we had the privilege of hosting Her Excellency, the Governor of Tasmania, Barbara Baker, and Professor Chalmers to see our literacy program in practice. Following staff analysis of our literacy data in 2020, St Paul's made a conscious decision to ensure our students, especially those in the early years, had every opportunity to become age appropriate literate so they could excel in their learning in all areas of the curriculum. All teachers were trained in the necessary phonological and phonemic awareness and we allocated time and money to speech and language programs, supported by Rosie Martin from Speech Pathology Tasmania. These programs began in 2021 and then Catholic Education Tasmania initiated a program called Intiailit which is delivered to all students at their level of understanding. Students who need additional support receive this through intervention. In 2022 the entire program is targeted, streamlined and focussed for the individual needs of all students in the early years and we have incorporated intervention and language programs for our students in the primary classes.

Next week is both Catholic Education Week and Science Week. St Paul's will be participating in events and activities in both these areas. Catholic Education Week's theme is 'Proclaim with Joy.' This week provides an opportunity for us all to recognise our committed and gifted teachers and support staff for their work in encouraging success, promoting discipline, supporting creativity, and instilling compassion in our young people. We thank them for their continued dedication and support for our students.

Science Week's theme is GLASS- more than meets the eye and it is an opportunity for us to celebrate science and technology. All our classes are eagerly preparing for our "SCIENCE FAIR" on Tuesday 16th August for all students and from 1.30 - 3.30pm for families in the hall.

The Governor of Tasmania visiting St Paul's Catholic School



"We learned how to cooperate with other team members. We also learned that with every disappointment, there is a happy moment" - Moranu


"We learned that it's not about winning with each other, it's not about arguing with each other, it's about gaining our strength with each other" - Kailee

Students can come and look at books and fill out their wishlist to take home to show their parents or guardians. Books are able to be purchased throughout the week.




<u>Costume Parade - Wednesday August 24th</u>










School Uniform Policy

It is a requirement of our school that students wear the correct uniform at all times in a neat and tidy manner. Wearing the correct uniform reflects the spirit and unity of the school community. Parents must contact or write to the Principal for exemptions from any part of the school uniform. The school uniform will be monitored by school staff going forward. This information can also be found in our Parent Handbook on the website.





Expectations:

- The school jackets (either fleece or soft shell) are expected to be worn, weather permitting.
 Any other jackets/jumpers are unacceptable and students will be asked to go to the office to borrow a school jacket for the day. This also applies to the polo tops. (Fleece jackets WILL NOT be part of our uniform in 2023)
- During cold weather, students are permitted to wear warm coats to and from school and while outside at recess and lunchtime but a school jacket must be worn under this outer coat.
- Hair needs to be clean and neat at all times. Boysand girls with shoulder length or longer
 hair must be tied back for health and safety reasons. Ribbons, clips, bands and scrunchies
 are to be of school colours (maroon or blue). Colouring or extreme hairstyles (e.g. tips or
 shaved inserts) are unacceptable and this includes extreme colour, and or totally changing
 the colour and shape of hair.
- Students are not to wear makeup, coloured nail polish or acrylic nails.
- Unacceptable jewellery (e.g oversized headband, oversized bows, chokers, large necklaces) will be asked to be removed and sent home. Acceptable forms of jewellery may include one or more of the following:
 - A set of earrings; these being plain studs worn in the lower ear lobes, this applies to both boys and girls.
 - A watch.
 - A Christian symbol worn around the neck e.g. a cross or medal.



<u>COVID-19 Safety Plan for Families (Term 3 2022)</u> – summarised from CET Safety Plan Version 15 (dated 25th July 2022)

- If unwell please stay away from school.
- All school activities are permitted including assemblies and travel.
- Parents and carers can enter schools.
- Positive cases are still required to isolate for at least 7 days and let the school know.
- Close contacts are still required to follow <u>close contact rules</u> for 7 days including testing daily before entering school and wearing a mask (all persons 12 years and older) in indoor settings when outside their home. School will provide 5 Rapid Antigen Tests for school students to enable daily testing when a student is a close contact.
- Face masks are no longer required to be worn in schools, early childhood centres or on public transport unless the person is a close contact.
- Public Health strongly encourages people to wear a face mask indoors where they cannot
 physically distance themselves, where they work in a public-facing role, or if they are at a higher
 risk of respiratory illness like COVID-19 and influenza.
- Students and family members can choose to wear a face mask and will be supported.
- Schools are no longer required to notify families on a case-by-case basis. Classrooms are not
 considered close contact environments however, should we have an outbreak in a classroom or
 in the school, our response will be advised by public health.
- The reinfection exclusion period has been reduced from 12 weeks to 28 days. People who have symptoms of COVID-19 within 28 days following their release from isolation do not need to test and isolate for 7 days.

Colds and flu

Students with cold or flu symptoms are required to stay home and test for two consecutive days.

If the person has twice tested negative on successive days for COVID-19 and their symptoms are mild (e.g. a runny nose) and they have indicated when asked that they feel well, then the person is permitted at school.

The wearing of a face mask by an adult with mild symptoms is encouraged.

If a child is symptomatic at school, they will be sent home and a Rapid Antigen Test supplied.

Transmission prevention

Vaccination is recommended for staff and students over the age of 5 years.

Any person entering our school is encouraged to sanitise their hands and socially distance where possible.

School will promote personal hygiene and cough/sneeze etiquette.

Where possible classrooms and workspaces will be well ventilated or air purifiers used.

School will undertake daily cleaning of surfaces touched at high frequency.


Toilets will be cleaned at least daily.



COVID-19 cases and close contacts



Do you have COVID-19?



Have you been told you are a close contact?

If you have symptoms, stay home and take a test.

Take a test:

• as soon as you find out you are a close contact

• every day that you leave the house for 7 days

• if you don't leave home every day, test again on day 6

• if you develop any symptoms.



Notify your close contacts and workplace/ education setting.

You can leave isolation 7 days after the date of your positive test if:

 Respiratory symptoms (cough, runny nose, sore throat, or shortness of breath) have gone, or are much better.

AND

 You have not had a fever (or signs of fever such as chills or night sweats for at least 24 hours).

The reinfection period for COVID-19 is 28 days. If you have previously had COVID-19 and develop symptoms more than 28 days after your release from isolation, get tested. You can also become a close contact again 28 days after previous infection and must follow close contact rules.

Notify your workplace.
Close contacts are at higher risk
of testing positive and passing
the virus on.



Wear a face mask indoors when outside your home.




Do not attend high risk settings, such as hospitals and aged care unless accessing urgent care, or are there as part of your employment.



Monitor for symptoms and get tested if you develop symptoms.



If you test positive at any time, follow the rules for COVID-19 cases.

Ludo offers:


- A play-based education program.
